

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
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BOOK REVIEW

This battle between my heart and my mind has sent me on a quest to obey my heart and overcome the excuses of my mind. Elvis Filote, my close Romanian friend, in the ministry he is involved with in Romania has struggled with this same issue. The methods they had used for 25 years were seeing little or no results. At Elvis' leading this summer they chose to retrain their workers and volunteers based on principles and truth that were presented in this book. The publishing house that I'm a part of translated and printed the book for them in Romanian.

HE COUNTS BY ONES!

In the parable of the lost sheep in Luke 15, there is an intimate look at God's great heart, pointed at those who represent Him, to instruct them that He counts by ones. In this parable, the shepherd leaves the 99 who aren't lost and goes out and searches the places that lost sheep go, to find the one that is lost. What a comfort, but also a challenge, to look at our own understanding of Him. Where am I going to look for lost people? How am I praying to find them? Do I mirror His heart?

This past summer, at the Jordan Family English Camp, my men's small group was quieted by the way Jesus attracted and held the attention of famous sinners. Why? What must He have been like to do that? What do we need to watch for in ourselves to follow Him accurately? Do we have God's heart for lost "ones"?

After the camp, the elders of this small evangelical church, just 60 miles from Syria, asked us about follow-up of the new believers: "We have to go to them, don't we?" This was the first time I had been asked that question in 27 years of evangelistic camp ministry! It's interesting that when the shepherd discovered the lost sheep, He joyfully picked it up and carried it on His shoulders back to the flock and safety! He didn't lead, pull, or chase the sheep, but instead carried this lost one back. God not only counts by ones but sets the example for us about doing the heavy lifting of discipleship and continuity of relationship.

Their next question was, "How long do we persist in chasing these new believers? Do we concern ourselves about possibly wasting time that could be better spent somewhere else?" I simply asked, "How long has God been pursuing you every day?" And I wanted to ask, "How efficient has that been for Him?" The act of carrying the sheep back to the fold is done from deep concern and compassion, not efficiency. Remember God loves us faithfully as His own, but not over and above the lives of each of the lost around us.

And then there is the celebration over "just" one in this passage, a celebration not only by God but by the heavenly hosts. Imagine the ongoing party around the throne at the saving of each soul. He even celebrates by "ones."

How are we doing as churches in going after the lost "ones?" Are we functioning more as a gathered church than a scattered church? Are we expecting them to come to us? Are we on our faces regularly as leaders, begging the Lord of the Harvest to show us where to look and how to find them? This is the heart of our sovereignly-loving God. He longs for the lost ones to turn and be found. He longs to send us to find them, with Him. Is this the God we are worshipping Sunday mornings? The One who counts by "ones"?

A MOTHER'S LOVE... AND GOD'S!

Can a woman forget her nursing child, that she should have no compassion on the son of her womb? Even these may forget, yet I will not forget you. Isaiah 49:15

Evangelistic English Camp in Romania was scheduled for the first week in July, 2017. And God was faithful to bring people to fill the camp. God supplied a great American team from Iowa and Michigan to serve at camp. Many youth attended who were not yet believers. A young teen came whose parents are believers and she knew that she was not. She was so anxious about her own salvation that she cried each time she spoke of it. She wanted to trust Christ, but knew she wasn't ready. (She did trust Christ a few weeks after camp through the ministry of one of our missionary wives who connected with her at camp.) Young men came who also had heard of Jesus, but were still captivated by the world's siren song. But this story is about mothers, not just one, but two who were marvelously (miraculously?) brought to camp by God.

One mother was praying for the salvation of her children, a girl age 21, and a son age 24. Romania was her home, but she had moved to Germany with her husband and children some 14 years ago. She and her husband attend a Bible-believing church in Germany, but their children remain unsaved. This family visited Romania just days before the camp. In a church this mother saw a poster about the camp. Even though she and her two children would know no one else at camp, she signed up to attend and brought her children that they might hear of Christ and be saved. What love! This was an opportunity from the Lord and she did not want to miss it. This mom, son, and daughter stayed all week with us. We are praying for the salvation of her children. Praise God for camp and for the clear message of God's love!

God brought another mother to camp for the first time, not from Germany this time, but from America. This mother is a school teacher who came on our team to share Christ with Romanian young people. And, oh, she has a heart for young

people! At camp she had special delight in teaching one of our English classes. Day after day she shared her testimony of being a homely kid growing up in rural America and not feeling special to anyone. She shared how cancer took one of her eyes, but God sustained her. She shared how she and her husband trusted Christ and built a life, not around the American dream, but on the solid rock of obedience to Christ as their Lord and Savior. She shared how, after a long career of teaching languages in the public school, she and her husband retired and served as missionaries in China for eight years. She has taken part in mission trips all over the world. But this was her first trip to Romania, and it was to serve at an English Language Camp. Do you get it? What doors God opens to share His magnificent love through English Camp!

Well, do you think the young people listened to her? Oh yes! She knew that God used her last summer - it was obvious to all of us - and she is eager to return this coming summer and bring more team members with her. Even now she is praying for these young people by name that God might save them through the Gospel of His love in Christ.

Along with this dear mother, we can't wait for English Camp next summer!

As parents, we are desperate for our boys to trust and follow Christ; nothing in life concerns us more. We have great kids, but there are days—no, seasons—in our home when it seems like Satan is winning. Caleb, our 14-year-old, went with me to Uganda this summer, and in the days before we left, things were so chaotic that I wasn't sure why I ever thought this crazy trip was a good idea! We had no idea that God would show us such an amazing miracle.

Lumala was a Muslim and a single mom. She said, "Allah requires us to be good to go to heaven." When I gently asked, "How good is good enough?" she looked at the ground and was silent. So we shared with her about God's grace and about what Jesus' death on the cross means for us. She had never heard anything like that, and she asked "What does Jesus require?" We shared that He wants a relationship with us where we trust Him completely—where we surrender ourselves to Him and trust Him to be in charge of our lives. He wants us to be willing to let Him love us. Then He will come and live in us and make us a part of His own family. When we asked her if she was ready for that kind of life-changing step she said, "So Very Ready."

Meanwhile, the other guys were sharing with a small group nearby and a teenager was arguing with them about God. Then suddenly, his countenance changed and he started asking good,

sincere questions. He ended up asking if he could trust in Christ also. Later we learned that the teenager was Lumala's oldest son!

Before we left, Lumala asked us to pray for her children, so of course we prayed that they would know Christ. That was the exact time when her son did the 180 and started to listen and respond to the Good News! So mother and son both received Christ as their Savior on the same day within about 100 feet of each other, without even knowing that the other one was having those conversations!

This trip certainly didn't cure all the things that we struggle with at home. But Caleb and I are deeply thankful that we were first-hand witnesses to God's amazing work. We know God has changed us. He has given us a fresh perspective on what truly matters (and what doesn't) in this life.

Standing Firm

Sometimes I see reminders of God's faithfulness in the most unexpected places. Just a few weeks after we arrived back from our summer travels, we went through a series of problems.

It began on a Wednesday with my oldest son getting a rusty nail in his knee during recess; three stitches. That same afternoon, my five-year-old son fell off the monkey bars and broke his wrist. Since we live in such an isolated place, this meant my husband had to catch a flight with him out to the nearest town so that he could take him to the ER. Thankfully, they were able to get on a plane that same night. On Saturday night, just before starting our prep for church the following morning, we discovered that my daughter had lice. Then on Tuesday we found out our youngest son had parasites. All this in the space of one week.

I've learned over the years that there is no such thing as coincidence. In a way, when things like this happen, we take it as encouragement. As a friend of ours put it, "Well, at least they know they're in God's will, otherwise the enemy would leave them alone!" In the middle of all this happening I was praying and asking that obvious question: "God, WHAT is going ON?" Then this verse from John 17 came to my mind, part of Jesus' prayer for the saints: "I do not pray that you would take them out of the world, but that you would protect them from the evil one."

For some reason, I have always taken that to mean that God would protect us from things like this happening at all. But then I remember; "In this

world you will have trouble, but take heart, I have overcome the world." (John 16:33) So I think it has more to do with what it says in Ephesians 6:13, "...so that when the day of evil comes you may be able to stand your ground, and after you have done everything, to stand." So here we are, by His grace, still standing.

It's late morning, the third day of our evangelistic business camp. I am sitting in the class. A group is sitting around a large square table. On my left, there is Diane who is leading the Bible reading time. I was praying in my spirit and watching the students. Looking at the students' sheets I saw that they had done their homework. All of them had read the Bible text printed on the Bible study sheets for the day and I noticed they had made lots of notes along individual lines of the text. It was clear they had studied and translated every single word of the Bible text and got ready for the lesson. They were participating and thinking about what they were reading and some of them even made very interesting comments and shared spiritually deep thoughts.

They were thinking deeply and asking good questions. However, I just could not overlook this young tall man, who was different from the rest of the group. His name was Tony. He didn't make any notes, he didn't want to answer any questions, he didn't want to look at us, he was just sitting there completely "frozen," showing no sign of cooperation. He was a nice and friendly man during the day, but it was just the Bible reading time when he got so strange. On that day we were reading the text about the prodigal son and the father patiently waiting for his son to return home.

It is a moving story showing who our God is. For the prodigal son it was a a moment when he experienced and fully realized who his Father is! But on that morning, it was a great moment for Tony. Since that moment, reading this story, his attitude changed. We even saw a smile on his face and he started to participate in our Bible reading lessons until the end of the camp. Later we learned that he came to the camp as a follower of Buddha and had absolutely no intentions to read the Bible. But the Word of God is like a beam of light that suddenly penetrates the darkness and reveals the Truth. I don't know, but I hope that Tony came to the camp as a Buddhist and left as a seeker of the True Living God.


Higher Than Us

refugees, especially people from the Arabic culture. Well, God gave us compassion for that group and we're still seeking God's leading about what that means for us. Meanwhile we want to be present where God has placed us and use tools we're equipped with, which means teaching English and Art. We understand our family is the greatest treasured tool. These are ways we take to reach out to the community. In February this year we started "Lighthouse World of English" and we're learning how to combine business and ministry. Discipleship is a precious but long journey, and we experience God's grace as we grow oh so slowly together with our friends.

Another "big" decision was to start the process of applying for foster family status. Our dream is to start a Christian Centre where we could DO CHURCH and BE CHURCH. Our precious friends, we ask you to



be in prayer for: Darek and Ewa Choszcz with their children Kuba and Maja—young believers searching for understanding of a developing new identity in Christ; Staszek and family—a man in a wheelchair who had a challenging past, but who has a heart for the homeless and alcoholic; and Ola Olewinska—our young friend from Ukraine who lived in our town and is now a connection in Paris among refugees.

"The weeks there are always the highlight of my year!" These words were spoken by one of our beloved teachers, also a college professor, who regularly gives up his spring and fall breaks to come to Mountainside Ministry Training Center (MMT).

MMT exists to prepare missionaries for ministry and acclimate them to the International Messengers (IM) family. Missionary trainees learn by living in community for 3.5 months, taking classes, and praying weekly for all missionaries and support staff in IM. We're thankful for our instructors who volunteer one week (sometimes two) each semester to teach discipleship, cultural adaptation, evangelism, inductive Bible study, spiritual warfare, church planting, prayer, support raising, or conflict management. For most, it's more than a one-week investment. The teachers often pray for their students before they meet them and then keep in touch after the class is done.

Some of the best learning and relationshipbuilding happens outside the classroom. During the week, teachers (and sometimes, their spouses) live at the Training Center with the students. After class they are available for prayer, visiting, counseling, playing games with kids, going on hikes, or treating students to dinner or ice cream.

instructors come from different backgrounds and life experiences, with unique personalities and gifts, but it's what they have in common that matters most to us. They love our students and freely give themselves to the task of sending out missionaries who are well-prepared. For that we are very grateful.

Blessings from Pine Ridge, South Dakota! God is at work and it is being seen throughout the Reservation! During the second week of September a group of men and women following the prompting of the Holy Spirit, went out and carried a ten-foot cross 55 miles across the Pine Ridge Reservation From Kyle to Pine Ridge Village. Many souls were touched by this week-long journey. George Dreamer Jr., the young man who received the vision from God around Easter time, received a ton of positive feedback and from the sounds of it, some people that may have been on the fence with Christianity and traditions, when they saw the cross being carried, they put their trust in Christ. A newspaper journalist did a story about the journey and it made the front page of the Native Sun News Today newspaper. He is looking to come back out to do a story on the positive outlook on Christianity on the Reservation. This has never been done. Praise God!

We have started a small motocross camp where we have youth from the community come out to learn about the Gospel and who Jesus really is. Along

with this, they learn how to ride dirt bikes, how to fix them, and learn other life skills as well.

Door-to-door ministry has been fruitful as well. God has granted us boldness and strength to go out into one of the most dangerous areas in the United States and proclaim the Good News of Jesus! Our family is doing well! With ups and downs along the way. Homeschool is going well, it is so neat to be able to see the progression in the education of our children! Heidi is able to read to her brothers and sisters, and the boys are learning the same material as Stacey teaches them preschool. WHAT HAS A DECADE OF English Camps Accomplished?

Last summer celebrated the tenth consecutive English Camp to partner with the Gorzow Baptist Church (GBC) in Poland. Every camp has left me encouraged and inspired by seeing God draw people into a new or deeper relationship with Himself.

Take Magda, for instance. Tears welled in her eyes on the second day of camp during the discussion about Jesus forgiving a paralyzed man's sin and dining with sinners (Mark 2:1-17). She said, "Now I understand. The church and its traditions have been a wall between me and God. He brought me here because He wants me to understand the truth—He loves me and wants relationship with me."

This year brought an extra dose of encouragement through a slide show containing pictures from the past ten years of camps. Reflecting on the past helped me to realize the growth in many campers' lives, and that

brought tears to my eyes.

Rizick and Carolina were a young couple with two children at the first camp. Having grown up in very difficult situations, they were struggling with marriage, parenting, and unemployment. They lived in an old one-room apartment in the back yard of GBC. Despite their hardships, they've attended every camp since and are now doing well. Rizick has been employed for five years. They've moved to a three-room apartment, and, with big smiles, they told us, "We even have a dog!" Their deepening love for Jesus is evident in their marriage, their parenting of their three children, and their involvement at GBC.





Pawel grew up in a dysfunctional family but got involved with the GBC youth group. That relationship led him to attend the first family camp, and he's returned every year since. For several years his faith floundered somewhat, but not anymore. Now, in his mid-twenties, he's made a solid adult decision to walk with God and leave his past behind. The last two years he has served on the camp's children's program team.

These are only two examples of the long-term impact of shortterm ministry.

The slide show revealed many more. What a blessing to bring God's transformational love and truth through EELC camps.

CHANGE COMES FROM THE LORD

"If Chris comes home and tells me we are moving to Mangalia, I don't know what I'm going to do."

Faith made this statement close to five years ago when we were ministering in Bistrita, Romania. Mangalia is a port city located in southern Romania right on the Black Sea, a ten to twelve hour drive away from the mountainous region of Romania we have grown to love. In 2007 God brought us to Romania to work with orphaned and abandoned children. But in 2012 God made it clear—a change was coming. In the last five years He changed our city, broadened our focus, and led us to International Messengers—but He did not change our love for Romania.

These changes did not happen overnight. God took it step-by-step in closing doors, but opening others. When the Lord closes a door it can be painful, it can bring doubt, it can bring thoughts of, "Did we do something wrong?" All these thoughts are normal, and can even be helpful if we get on our knees and prayerfully evaluate our circumstances. Even though they are painful the Lord is using this time to prepare us and build us up for the open door He has prepared for us. It helps us to evaluate, to redirect, and to pinpoint the calling God has on our lives.

In 2007 I never dreamed of living on the Black Sea, and preparing to plant a church in a spiritually dark region of Romania by ourselves. Thank you God for knowing all this already and preparing us. Thank you God for being there with us each step. And thank you God for promising to be there each step after this one. "For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts." Isaiah 55:9 (ESV)

GOD'S TRANSFORMING POWER At Work in Gulu, Uganda

Greetings fellow servants of the Most High God, it is such a great pleasure for me to be part of this ministry; I, the worst of all sinners saved by grace.

A month and a half ago, it pleased God that I move to Gulu, in the north part of Uganda, to minister to the community of Pawel Adak. Though it is the same country, it is totally a different culture, lifestyle, and language.

For years, the region was in war between the rebel group called the Lord's Resistance Army (LRA), and the Government of Uganda. Pawel was one of the centers of fighting—each of the people we are serving alongside have lost at least one person they were close to because of this war. We opened the church there a year ago, and in recent months we have seen a transformation of these people from war lovers and threatened people, to loving and caring people who have the love of Christ inside their hearts.

Peace has prevailed for around five years, though many people are still facing the trauma of the war. But God in His mercies is transforming this region, and this can be seen even in the praise/worship and the

testimony full of forgiveness and joy by the elect of Christ here.

Many people here have either little or no education due to the insurgence—only a few can read or write or even speak a little English. The area is faced with rampant early marriages and






low productivity yet with large extended families composed of mostly women and children. Young men and women who are in Christ are zealous to serve the almighty with all they have, and mostly together with the youth of Pawel Adak, "We are now focusing on being merciful to those who doubt; snatching others from the fire to save them..." Jude 22-23.

We have not had an English Camp before but I am sure we need it a lot, based on the population composition and our ambitions as some were shown above. This will open our chances to share Christ and also provide an opportunity for evangelism.

I am so thankful for your support and for loving us. May the Almighty God bless you always and abundantly!

DO YOU WANT TO SEE Lives Being Transformed?

Come with us on an imaginary trip to the countries of Egypt, Jordan and Lebanon. Jesus is mightily at work in individual lives as well as in the community life of groups and local churches.

God is at work in the hearts of people in Egypt, in the North as well as in the South. Our young Egyptian co-workers reach out to many poor people, also in these extremely needy areas of Upper Egypt in the South. Church and camp work are growing rapidly, also in Alexandria in the North.

Jesus deeply touched and renewed young people during the English Youth Camp near Alexandria last summer, and he did the same kind of revolutionary work in the spirits and souls of young people during our two Jordan camps in July and August. North American short termers worked hand-in-hand with local Christians on behalf of a lot of young Palestinian Jordanians. This kind of ministry opens up the channel for the Spirit of God to change a nation from the inside.

From Egypt and Jordan the Lord has moved us to Lebanon. This fall we do our first Mission Training School for young future leaders on the outskirts of Beirut. The classisthe most interesting combination of students we've ever had. There are Lebanese people with Maronite-Catholic background who experienced a mighty breakthrough in their lives, and are now living radical lives for Jesus, going through situations of persecution because of their faith. There are also participants with Muslim background, one of them from Kurdistan. What a mixture in one group! The students are bonding

well with each other. Yet this is not always easy: well-settled Lebanese Christians together with Syrian refugees who have lost everything and need to start in a more or less hostile country from below zero. We pray for unity daily, and God is with us. Our Syrian students have in mind to go back and spread the Gospel among their own people as soon as the doors will open for them. We count it a huge privilege to train believers who will go to a war-torn country.

We are very blessed to support believers of various backgrounds in Lebanon, since this country is a hub for many nations and beliefs. What an exciting time to live in!

I CAN'T TEACH ENGLISH!

"There is NO WAY I can do this!" My mind wanted to scream as it started whirling like a Ferris wheel. The more Darwin continued to talk through the teaching material for English Class time, the more I wanted to disappear into my seat. I was on the verge of having a meltdown. That was 2008, at the age of 16, preparing for my first short-term trip with IM to Ukraine. Nine years and ten camps later, I realize how the Lord used that camp to start me down the long road of trusting Him.

In 2014, I embarked on my first trip without any of my family members. At this English day camp in Radom, Poland, I was stretched spiritually but God grew my faith by leaps and bounds. Our Father is drawn to a heart that is needy for Him. There was a young man at that camp who claimed to be an atheist but he kept asking questions and each time, the Lord gave me an answer in some form. One year later, this young man decided to give his life to the Lord and now he is presently attending one of the IM ministry training centers. MISSIONARIES DO GREAT THINGS


Yes, missionaries do great things—well, at least we are supposed to do great things, and we want to do great things. But what are "great things"? Plan a big meeting, preach a great sermon, establish a training program or Bible school? Yes, these things are good; but they are not the main thing. "And what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (Micah 6:8)

Missionaries really do organize schools, teach the Bible, help the homeless and orphaned, plant churches, train nationals, etc., but we must remember the foundation for all of these things is the love of God. "If I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing." (2 Corinthians 13) Just like you, we face the challenge of getting too busy, the weight of deadlines, bills to be payed, and people who "rub us the wrong way." We have heard some say, "But missionaries are 'different people', they can handle it, they are super human." No, we are not, we are absolutely not. We are people who have also failed, who are weak, who struggle sometimes in relationships, who get ill, have surgeries, and wonder how in the world to pay our bills. We are sometimes quite weak, but we have made a very important decision; we have decided to lay everything on the altar, to follow and serve God with our whole hearts. This sounds good, sounds like the perfect first line to a missionary hymn I think, but what do missionaries do with their weaknesses? We can't run over to our best friend's home for support, or seek our pastor's counsel for advice. We are here, alone, and at times very needy, hoping people are praying for us. Small things, little encouragements make such a difference for us—for me.

This summer in the midst of camp season, children coming and going, visitors, and animal care responsibilities, a friend showed up, actually the mother of our friend. She jumped out of her car, came to me with a hug, and a large basket of homemade jams she had made. It was a small gesture of love, but it reminded me that someone was also thinking of me, a little bit like a "hug from

God." Then just this weekend a friend invited us and a few other English-speaking friends to her home for an absolutely wonderful dinner. Barbara butchered her favorite turkey for us, whom she named Joseph Stalin so she wouldn't feel so bad when she had to kill it. We felt welcome within the group and thought it was especially nice that Bevan was asked to give the prayer for the meal.

Our camps this summer were filled with wonderful children, times of coming closer to God, and decisions to become believers among children from the children's home. I am so happy to report these things, but I chose this topic instead, to remind myself, and you, that missionaries are real, and at times needy. Serving Refugees IN ODESSA, UKRAINE

My name is Aleksander Litvak. I am the pastor of Christian Light Fellowship Church in Odessa, Ukraine, where I have served as a pastor for ten years. I have a wife and four kids--three girls and one boy. It has been a very good experience for me to serve as a pastor, to learn how to serve other people, and to see how God is bringing new believers into His family, how He is changing lives, and how He is building His kingdom here by using us as His tools.

For the last two years God has put it in our hearts to serve the refugees from Eastern Ukraine who had escaped the war zone and come to Odessa to find shelter. As a church we invited them for an hour every Sunday before the service started for some fellowship—getting to know them and hearing their stories. At the end we had a bag of food for everyone and we invited them to stay for the service. Many refugees faithfully came to church and continue to attend. We are very excited about that, and one of the goals for this year is to start a Bible study to help them (and others) grow stronger in the knowledge of the Bible and become stronger believers.



I am also very happy to share with you about our evangelistic youth English camp that we had last summer. By God's mercy He gave us a very blessed time of sharing the Good News with a lot of unbelievers. There were some challenges, because we had not met many of the youth before. They got together in a small groups, where some were open and some were very closed. By the end of the camp we saw people making decisions to trust Christ! Called to the Sikhs

By the time I finished my BA in Christian Studies in 2014 and was considering a new career, I had learned that my gifting was in administration, even though my passion was in discipleship and missions. I determined that the best way to manage that was to get a job in the head office of a mission organization. That way I could be working in the area of my gifting and still fulfill my passion.

However, I discovered that I was not satisfied with just enjoying my passion vicariously through our missionaries, I had to be doing it myself—even if I wasn't good at it! I determined to find people who could train me and I would get better through practice. So that is what I have been doing these last two years.

I began to realize that there are a lot of Sikhs in my city, in fact, about 23% of our population is made up of people who come from the province of Punjab, India! I had been open to discipling/evangelizing whoever I could until about March of 2017. It was then that something happened that caused me to believe God was calling me to focus on reaching

the Sikhs. I met a man who lived in another city who wanted to come one day a week to my city to reach out to Sikhs. He had the same mentality as I did and was open to learning the discipleship multiplication strategy that I had been trained in. So we discussed different strategies to find the person of peace and suddenly I had a thought. Why don't we ask the Holy Spirit what strategy we should use rather than spending a lot of time in trial and error? So we spent the week praying separately and then came together again to see if the Holy Spirit had told both of us the same thing. We discovered that God had given both of us the same location for finding the person of peace! Since then we have been prayer-walking around that area, which has a concentration of Sikhs in

it, waiting for the Holy Spirit to make the next move. In the meantime I am learning Punjabi and trying to make friends with them.

Why an IM Camp?

Growing up in Southern California, I was able to go to Mexico on a few short-term mission trips. One week we built an outhouse for a church. We cooked, dug, and attended services as a team. We accomplished our goal and the church had an outhouse when we left...a huge blessing. I appreciate that even more now, as our Slovak Roma church has only an outhouse. There was no translator scheduled that week for outhouse digging. Now that I'm a translator, I understand that. We played with the kids, but didn't have meaningful conversations due to the language barrier. I'm thankful for how that week widened my world, but after a week "in country" I hadn't connected with any of the locals.

Once, as a young teen, I served on a crew that painted a small church on an indian reservation in Arizona. On that trip I learned the power of working as a team and saw what impact cultural differences have on lifestyle choices. Our relationships with each other grew, we slept on concrete floors—in spite of crawling vermin—had fun, and succeeded in accomplishing our goal. But, I don't remember anyone from that reservation.

Many short-term mission trip options exist today for anyone feeling led to minister somewhere internationally. I've gone on many short-term trips and I've also led many short-termers, all of which has led me to be a strong proponent of IM's English Camp ministry. Why IM? Well...Laco, Valer, Irina, Andrej, Anna, Robo, Viera, Dodo, and many more involved in ministry today here in Slovakia are a result of an English Camp. They came, got to know people who shared their lives and testimonies with them at camp...in English. Relationships matter, and they last.

Before the English Camp began, I had been praying 'God, I want to know You.' But even after the camp, I couldn't understand the Gospel."

Working to Make a Difference father's HEART

Sometimes we don't know how much we have touched others' lives or how much we will be missed, nor do we fully realize what spiritual giants we walk among and rub shoulders with. Then they are gone and we suddenly realize. God has his people scattered amongst the crowd and we are some of them ourselves, if we will just allow ourselves to be used by him. We work very hard and believe that we are making a difference in our little part of the world. It doesn't seem heroic but we know that by dedicating each day to God it will be used more than we can imagine.

For example, I have spent weeks moving dirt provided by three large excavating companies agreeing to haul it to me for free. I wake up, throw my clothes on like a fireman and run to my loader, working until I can't see in the dark, hoping to get a new horse corral made before winter. The problem is that it is bordering the river which is prone to flooding. I now have an area about the size of a football field raised shoulder height that is ready for fencing starting next week. Some of the village neighbors who see our tenacity and vision are coming around to respect us. God has used our hardships and witness to turn once adversaries into allies.

Fortunately, I don't just move dirt. Last week I was asked to preach at a church in Kosice that we helped start with two evangelistic outreaches 15 years ago. They were celebrating the completion of their building. I saw friends I hadn't seen in years and was deeply moved by their testimonies of how our life had touched theirs and made a huge impact on them. It was like I got to hear what people were going to say one day when we are gone. The event lasted all day and I was surrounded by many who wouldn't leave until I did. The 17 years we spent there continues to bear fruit in people's lives and in the churches that we helped.

I don't feel much like a hero, especially here in Socovce, pushing dirt around. We have only been here a few years but already a lot of lives have been touched and hearts changed. One sweet girl from an orphanage, with a very difficult past, who was in my small group at camp this summer, gave her heart to Jesus and wants to spend as much time as possible with Laura and learn to ride horses. Janka is one of 14 from that orphanage who is now walking with Jesus following this summer's camps.

FIRST BIG VICTORY

This year we saw the first-fruits of our work from the pathway that God set us on more than four years ago! In February I opened a Christian Counseling clinic named KUZNIA (www.kuznia.org.pl/en) for men who are struggling with sexuality. It is probably the first place of its kind that offers professional help in Poland that is based on a Biblical process of healing. I am very grateful to God for His help, without which I know I wouldn't be able to write to you today about its opening. Lives are being transformed thanks to the Holy Spirit's work in our group sessions, individual therapy, and also through online meetings via Skype. God has also given me the privilege to share what He has taught me through lectures on discipleship, mentoring, and pornography addiction.

This year we established men's small groups. We organized a cycle of meetings from the Band of Brothers curriculum. We discussed important elements of every man's life--difficulties, challenges, dreams, and purpose that God has given us. As a part of these meetings, we went on an adventure in the mountains, in order to use some physical effort and not only our brains. We also published an eBook about protecting

children from pornography.



Piotr Kapera

Piotr lives in Niepolomice, Poland, and desires to raise awareness among men—by using the issue of sexual bondage—about their need to become disciples of Christ. Hoping their transformation will allow them to become spiritual leaders in their own families and to make disciples within the environment where they live.

There are plenty of challenges, therefore I need lots of prayers. Please pray for me and for this ministry, for perseverance in walking with Christ, for God's will in the ministry and in my private life, and for men to have more and more opportunities to experience the transforming grace of God.



The Lord's Ministry in Hungary

Approaching the half way mark in my 15th year of service to the Lord in Kaposvar, Hungary, I am awestruck at what He is doing. After a couple of years of physical issues (some resulting in surgery), I am on the road to feeling wonderful, with energy to spare, and thanking the Lord for this good time.

I have been volunteering at our local hospital on the oncology floor for five years. My friend who works there visits with me. The object is to build relationships with these people who are suffering and to show them that there is hope in Christ.

For almost 14 years I have been serving with Prison Fellowship in a jail that houses around 250 inmates who are awaiting trial—sometimes they have to wait a year or two before having a trial. We offer English lessons followed by a Bible study and prayer. Until recently mostly men attended, but now women are getting interested as well. In the last year three women have put their trust in Christ during our lessons. This is so exciting for me to see how faithful the Lord is.

I was also asked to mentor and share about my life with a European Union group that invites young people to volunteer and learn about Hungary's culture. Most of them stay for one year, teaching their languages at schools and volunteering their

services for festivals and such. I offer them English classes and invite them to my place for meals and other get-togethers so I can get to know them. From this opportunity, I have three young people to mentor from Lithuania, Germany, and Estonia. I thank the Lord for the opportunities I have had to share my testimony and the gospel along with giving Bibles to them. The program directors have asked me to feel free to share my faith. When I first got involved with this group and they heard me pray at all the functions, I thought I was not going to last—but just the opposite happened. At our last meeting there were 28 young people and every continent was represented—it was a great time! Most of these young people have no church or religious background outside of Islam. So God has opened this door wide and he continues to expand this ministry. Praise His name!



Barb Gorman

Barb lives in Kaposvar, Hungary. She serves in her church, teaches English, works with students, and is involved with prison ministry.

I prayed that the Lord would minister to me even as I prayed that He would use me as a blessing. My view of Middle Eastern people changed as well as my confidence in God to reach out to them and to change their hearts. I left behind those that I consider more than friends, but family who I love dearly. BLESSED BY THOSE KIDS

"I didn't come here to work with THESE kids." This was a comment by a short-termer that shocked me a little on a recent mission trip to Estonia. I think we could put that on the list of things for a short-termer not to say or even think. Along with, "This has been a good vacation." and "I didn't spend money for this kind of experience."

THOSE kids were not the reason that I was in Estonia either. I had come to build relationships with partners of my ministry and to spend time learning more about my new work. I was going to send emails, complete a lot things on my work-to-do list, talk, rest, and enjoy the view. However, there were some children (crazy monkeys!) that belonged to the Lord and He put me in that place to serve them.

The wild monkeys turned out to be nice children who needed to be loved and cared for. They had grown up in an orphanage and had little to no supervision. They didn't know how old they were, but I guessed

around five or six. Young orphans without supervision are expected to be a little wild and often referred to as THOSE kids that no one wants to work with.

At the end of the time, that short-termer that had a plan for her time there that didn't include THOSE kids thanked me for serving them. I told her that I was so blessed by my time with them and by seeing how God's love for them transformed them that I didn't need to be thanked. I was deeply encouraged and blessed by the Lord as we played, sang, danced, made crafts, picked wild strawberries, and walked along the beach in lion masks.

If you're considering a shortterm trip, be sure to prepare



yourself to arrive and have it be entirely not what you planned. Then take a deep breath and thank Him for knowing what you would encounter and that He prepared you to do the work that was set before you for that time. Don't say, "This is not what I came for," because you'll miss out on the blessing.



Laura Rechkemmer

Laura is currently working in partnership with Stoneworks International handling finances, communication, and other administrative tasks. She is based in the US, but assists partners in Russia, Ukraine, Belarus, Romania, Montenegro, and Estonia. The majority of the work is ministering to orphans living in orphanages or those who have aged out.

Missions' Impact on Students

"We're so grateful for your ministry," a father recently wrote us, "not only for the huge impact it has had on women and children in Romania, but on our kids as well. Our son wrote his college admissions essays about his experiences in Romania, and they have shaped what he wants to do for his future vocation. He wants to pursue international law, specifically defending the rights of children and advocating for them."

When we moved to Romania in 1998 to serve God by ministering to needy Romanian women, children, and elderly, we never expected the impact our obedience to serve our Lord Jesus Christ would have on other Christians' lives, particularly the profound impact on high school and university students at this significantly pivotal stage in their lives. In 2017 alone, approximately 20 university students and 80 high school students have served alongside us here on short-term mission teams. This fall we expect another high school team and church youth group team, both from Vienna, totaling another 40 to 50 students.

One university student who served with us for six weeks this past summer, through the IM Redeem the Summer Internship program, wrote, "I had such an amazing summer, and God taught me so much. I also loved hearing how God worked in your lives. It has really inspired me to give my whole life to Christ and to listen to His direction. Thank you so much for spending this time with me, I had so much fun and learned a lot! I hope to keep in touch and possibly return next summer with a few more people along with me, God willing."

We've seen some major U-turns in young people's lives that have come to serve here. It's not about us, or this place in particular; it's about the profound impact that serving the Living God has on someone's life! What an unexpected blessing it has been for us to see and be a part of His work in the lives of these students!

They weren't in my group, but they were relatives of one of the ladies who was. She was standing behind them in tears. "Zofia is ready to accept Christ," one of them said with obvious emotion, "would you be willing to pray with her?" To say the least I was surprised and thrilled at the same time! We all went into another room for more privacy and sat around in a circle. I talked with Zofia and could tell that she was prepared to make the biggest decision anyone could make—to become a follower of Jesus. She prayed, and when we were finished there was hardly a dry eye in the room. Hers were beaming with joy.

This beautiful event was one of the highlights of my summer. It took place at a family camp in southern Poland in mid-July. It is a perfect example of how such camps are used by God in a powerful way to complement the ministry that goes on the rest of the year. You see, Zofia had been attending a Bible study with an IM missionary in her town for over six months. During that time the Word of God was doing its work in her heart, softening the soil, so that by the time the camp came around she was the good, fertile earth that was ready for the Gospel.

What makes the camps so effective? I think it's because we're all in one place for a week, without any distractions. In "normal life" everyone is so busy that it's hard to get together, whereas the camps provide many opportunities for conversation. It's as if friendship evangelism is set to "turbo power." Some of the people who attend are like Zofia, ready to make a commitment to the Lord. Others are further away, like Mathew, a self-declared agnostic who was in my English class. But regardless of where anyone is in relation to the Lord, everyone is touched by God's love, and that is the power of the camps.

FRIENDSHIP HOUSE - RADOM, POLAND

Friendship House is a ministry dedicated to reaching the homeless and addicted of Radom, Poland. It has just passed its five-year anniversary.

Radom is a city of about 250,000 people and the unemployment here is around 25%—this is much better than before. We continue to reach out to the people of the street with a many-faceted approach. We have the direct approach when we

visit the "underpass" located near us. We bring with us coffee, tea, and sandwiches and visit with whoever will come. Generally we serve 40 - 50 people every Sunday night. This is where we meet "new" people and begin the slow process of starting a relationship. Eventually they begin to trust us.

this point At we invite them to come to the Friendship House for a meeting and soup supper every Tuesday. This meeting is designed to present who we are (believers and followers of Jesus Christ) and who we represent (Jesus Christ). Although this is a "Christian" country—it is a mystery to them when we present the Gospel and talk about a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. After a "short" message (no longer that 20 minutes) we serve a hearty soup along with bread, and we encourage conversation. We average around 30 people at these meetings.

At the Tuesday meetings we also offer physical help for them such as coffee and tea, conversation, clothing of all kinds, showers, minor medical treatment, a 12-step addiction program, and therapy programs at rehabilitation centers. Friendship house is designed to house men and women who are committed to going to rehabilitation and can stay with us until a place opens. If the person completes the 18-month


rehab program, he/she will be invited to come back to Friendship House and we will help them to find work, to find a place to live, and to put their finances together.

We host internships and really enjoy sharing this ministry with other believers who desire to go "ON THE FIELD"!

We are currently looking for a couple to help us

with the ministry and eventually replace us here at Friendship House. We have both recently celebrated our 70th birthdays. God has really blessed us with good enough health and strength over the past years and we are so thankful—but we are NOT spring chickens ③. We ask for prayer that God will lead this couple to us soon!

Through every turn, trial, bout with depression, frustration, and general confusion, God has sustained us! He moves this ministry forward in spite of our shortcomings. Every now and then we are blessed by a glimpse into the mighty work He




My work here in Oradea is more relational than anything else. It will surely prove to be a marathon rather than a quick jaunt. After finishing my internship, God led me here to a new city. Instead of caring for children full-time I've now been spending my days (and late nights) building relationships, leading Bible studies and outings with women who have aged out of the orphanage, as well as spending afternoons playing games and sharing Bible stories with kids still stuck behind the walls of a damp orphanage.

I showed a video for the women in Bible study and they baulked at the idea that Jesus changes everything when we give our lives over to Him. You see—to them, they don't believe this because they say that when they have tried to trust God, He didn't change the fact that they are without a family, a house, a job, etc. So we talked about how salvation is the ultimate gift He gives; that He doesn't promise us "things" but rather Himself, forgiveness of sins, salvation, hope of Heaven, a new life purposed for His glory, etc.

Still their hearts were hardened to the truth. So I asked them this question—if you pray and pray to God for something and the only thing you receive is a deeper relationship with Him and a deeper understanding of grace, will that be enough for you? ... It's a challenging question even for me and I hope the Holy Spirit will stir their hearts to fully put their trust in Him.

It's a daily investment, one that does not always appear fruitful. But then at a night of worship one gal asks if I will walk down with her and suddenly all the late nights, the preparing, mornings of prayer and endless conversations have a greater purpose than anything else in the world.
