

MERCY, RISK, AND OUR REWARD

As with most of you, there has been little of normal in this year for my wife and me. We helped with a discipleship retreat in Egypt in February, and on the flight home, the girl next to us was masked with gloves on and she spent ten minutes disinfecting every surface on her seat and the wall in front of us. We were slightly amused and even wondered why we weren't this concerned! Then COVID-19 became part of our lives! We canceled our spring IM staff conference at the last moment in April and then, one by one, our staff canceled the evangelistic ministries they were planning. No camps, no teams needed, no training to do, no vacancies to pray full. Very strange for us after 29 years of this "routine" of ministry.

But one camp stayed open, an Evangelistic Family and Youth English camp in Beirut. Lebanon had quite a year with fires, floods, government collapse, mass demonstrations, food shortages, hyper-inflation, and then COVID. We wondered who would be crazy enough to go with us. We had to sort our own theology to see what we really believed about the worthiness of God's Kingdom and His sovereign hand. And then God provided a team, mostly motivated by not wanting to miss what God might have for them there. So, we headed down the road of preparation. We must have cancelled the camp five times for various travel limits or financial reasons, but each time, by day's end, God had opened a way. Finally, we walked into an echoing O'Hare airport, flew on a mostly empty plane to a packed Charles de Gaulle, and then rode a full flight into Beirut. Upon landing, we were welcomed with another 'brain swab' and finally released to get after the ministry. We knew the only reason we had a team in Lebanon was God. He had placed us there by His hand.

He brought a unique combination of worn believers, curious Druze, M's, Catholics, and a small "family" of women in hiding due to their new faith. Our team from North America, Egypt, and Poland was ideal for this group in giftedness, age, and humility. God knew what was needed.

We saw an immediate openness to the Gospel, to being heard, and to join in relationship. We were taken by the compassion of the believers towards those still outside the body of Christ.

The perceived danger of the trip drew a crowd of maybe 1000 people praying for us and the Gospel went out easily and was received so quietly it was remarkable. And it was hot, hot, hot, and humid! There was no virus outbreak and no nefarious types coming in to interrupt. On the third day, the country locked down, but we were allowed to finish the camp. Another mercy of God. There was such solid progress in understanding and many delightfully deep conversations around the Gospel. The hard times had tenderized these folks. Even our advanced English class was rich. They spoke openly, shared honestly, and laughed together. A conversation on giving and receiving affirmation rocked the group, both believers and lost. God was working.

The camp finished well after four intense days. We celebrated together, worshipped joyfully, and started the somber goodbyes. Late afternoon, I received a message that our travel agent wanted to get the team out two days early, which meant leaving yet that night. We talked and prayed and headed to the airport before midnight. He had heard a rumor that flights from Beirut might end on Monday, the day before the terrible explosion.

We left a bit puzzled and disappointed, but nothing could dampen the wonder of seeing how God miraculously delivered us into Beirut and then poured His Spirit out on the work among these Lebanese families and young people. Darlis and I returned home tired, thankful, and so very satisfied with the purpose we'd had in this part of 2020. It was a crazy plan to get more life and know Jesus more at our age!

There is an agenda for the lives of the redeemed to take risks, to worship expensively, to trust God and mercifully take the Gospel to lost people, and then to resolutely celebrate ALL that God gives us in that walk of faith.

It was akin to some sort of ancient-male-testosterone-ego-thing, but we did it, and we did it together. Somewhere between all the foolishness and the food, the Lord created a bit of openness between us that was a precious gift.

I took a trip with Samuel too. We played and prayed, (and fought a little), and ate a lot. We planned to canoe together, but we convalesced in a hotel room and then spent some time in the great outdoors. On the way home, I was inwardly accusing myself because I spent more time playing with Sam than I spent praying with him. At that very moment, Samuel took out his earbuds and said, "Dad, thanks for doing this with me. It was the most fun I've ever had in my life." That sentence was the "I love you" of a 13-year-old boy. Mission accomplished.

So I'm learning not to second guess the Lord. He knows which opportunities are most needed. Even though we couldn't go to Hungary, He provided some treasured opportunities in my athome mission field.

GOD'S LOVING PRESENCE in Times of Crisis

Since 2014, I've been serving with IM in Egypt. As a graduate of the Faculty of Arts, I live in Alexandria at the Mediterranean. Praise, worship and music, and teaching are my tools to spread the Gospel. I also have a 16-member "Praise Team." We divided the team into small groups where they are continuously discipled. God's call in my life is to preach and make disciples visiting all kinds of local churches, conferences, and going to many unreached villages.

This year's pandemic all over the country made ministry extremely difficult. But with online meetings connecting churches and communities, I could encourage believers and speak into the lives of many who don't know God. The Evangelistic Family Camp in Lebanon this summer made an extraordinary impression on me. There I met people from different backgrounds, believers, traditional "name" Christians, Muslims, and atheists. I made friends with most of them and until now I am still connected with them. With some of them, I pray regularly online.

Only a few days after the camp, an explosion occurred in Beirut. I was in a car on a street next to the blast. God protected me. After this enormous blast, one person from IM in Egypt and I had a time of prayer. The event shocked us, but inside we deeply felt the peace to stay longer in Beirut. People in Lebanon would tell us, "Go quickly home!" But we changed our airline tickets and stayed another two weeks to visit victims of the catastrophe, share the Gospel, and encourage them. Through the IM Food Program we were able to provide food and water. Looking back, I am amazed to see how the prayers of the IM family protected me and the team on the ground.

And I am so thankful that God made me temporarily empty-headed. Next time, maybe the eye-patch won't be necessary.

GOD In Creative Ways S

At the beginning of the year, we had many plans for the ministry in Upper Egypt and outside of the country. But God seemed to have a different opinion. Like with all of us, because of the pandemic, most of my plans had to be changed. At first, it disappointed me. But after some time, I saw God using me in His creative ways. I began sharing the Gospel with others on the Internet and on the phone. I went down to farmers in the fields to share the Good News with them. For the first time, I was invited by a popular Christian TV program to present the Word of God to millions of viewers. A young man who had watched the show called me. He felt God speak to him through this program. He had seriously considered becoming a Muslim. But God interfered at the right time when this young man accidentally turned on the TV. This was very encouraging for me because we both could pray

together and something very important changed in his heart. Something similar happened when I was invited to speak through Zoom in front of a bigger Russian auditorium. God can transform all things for good.

Because of the six-month strict church lockdown, people in our region became hungry again for the Living Word. Many invitations have been made to me to preach in all kinds of churches, even in the Coptic-Orthodox Church. After one such outreach, a young man followed me. He wanted to talk with me personally. Many times he had considered ending his life. He said that there was nothing in his life he could thank God for. We talked for hours. I shared







with him about God's goodness and love. I then invited him to pray with me, and he gave his life to Christ!

I could add many interesting stories that happen daily in the ministry of my team in Menya. God blessed us with several interns from the Desertside Training Center: Mina, Mamdouh, Romany, and Georgina. Despite the dangers of getting COVID, each of them has a group of young people that they continuously disciple. One of these disciples was suffering from severe inferiority. His mother had died, and since then, his father had abused him for many years. During our recent camp, after many talks and prayers and while experiencing our loving and respectful fellowship, a miracle happened in his life. Today he is free. Another young man was suffering from depression because of the sudden death of his best friend. He had totally isolated himself. Through

many prayers and because of our loving fellowship, this man got out of depression. We sometimes walk a long way with addicted young people. In the end, God's powerful Word and the love of the team has been changing and saving many of them.

To shut our doors to their many needs was almost traumatic. No more showers, washing their clothes, daily coffee/tea, soup, 12-step recovery meetings, large group meetings, one-on-one counseling. They allowed us to keep our street ministry of giving out sandwiches, but only if they would take and GO! No hanging around and talking.

We busied ourselves with projects that we "never had the time" to do—some renovations and much needed cleaning and repairing. The place has never been in such good condition! Vera and Ewa started making masks for our clientele—many, many masks!

Little by little (as allowed), we opened up different areas of the ministry—but this ministry probably will look much different from before. That's not all BAD! We are always searching for different outreaches, and this forced us to re-evaluate the ministry—always a good thing.

The extra time together with Artur, Ewa, and their boys was very special. Although we have always had a good and respectful relationship with them—the time together during the Covid shutdown has drawn us much closer. We had "time" to just sit and talk about "LIFE!" Changes are difficult but vital to the health of Friendship House ministry! We ask for prayer for discernment for the direction of the ministry and prayer to be open to and aware of God's leading. WHO'S MORE AFRAID?

Earlier, when Covid was just becoming serious, I was doing my exercise, jogging around a small park near my home, when I saw several people sitting in a corner. They looked like they were homeless. Later, I saw one young man leave the group and go sit by himself on a bench. I decided I would go to him after I finished jogging to see if I could have a spiritual conversation with him.

He was still sitting there when I was done, so I walked his way to say, "Hi." As I was coming up to him, he responded, and so I asked how he was doing. He answered and asked me the same—a sign he was open to a conversation. I stopped and asked him if he was homeless. He said, "No, but the others are." After a few minutes, I discovered that he had been kicked out of his home because he was addicted to drugs. I agreed with him that drugs do make a person feel better temporarily, but it never lasts, and, "When we come off our high, the pain comes back." He said, "That's why I try to stay high." I suggested that drugs would ruin his life and that there was a better way. I asked if I could show him something. He said, "Yes."

I had the 3 Circles Gospel Presentation app on my phone, so I went and sat close to him so I could share my screen with him. I briefly wondered if he

might have Covid but thought I would trust God to protect me. As I shared the presentation with him, I noticed that when I talked to his face, he would look away.

He wasn't ready to accept Jesus, but he now had some things to think about. After the presentation, I mentioned that we were sitting too close together, and should I be afraid that he had Covid? Then I said, "What if you are afraid that I have Covid? He said, "Don't you know that a runny nose is one sign of Covid?

That was when I realized that after running, my nose usually joins in and runs too, so he saw that I was sniffing and was worried! Oh well! I guess it was time to go!

Faithful Through the Pain

Just a few weeks ago, I went for an ultrasound for my 11-week pregnancy, only to be told that the baby had died. This makes my fourth miscarriage (plus five beautiful kids at home).

As I was driving home after this appointment—pondering; processing—I thought about how many people we have known who started out following Jesus but then have gone through something hard and unexpected—like a miscarriage or loss of a loved one, or trouble in their marriage. So many times, we have watched people turn their backs on God during these trials, and it breaks our hearts.

Honestly, I understand. Each time I've gone through these things, it has challenged my faith. And yet, the more I cling to Jesus, the more I learn to trust Him no matter what happens. That day, as I processed this new grief, I considered the things that Jesus went through leading up to the cross—the betrayal, abandonment, abuse, and false accusations—all that grief and sorrow, and I thought; was any of that necessary for our salvation? Wasn't it simply His death that covered our sin? So why did He go through all the rest?

As I thought about it, there were three things I took from it: First, that as Christians, even if we could obey God perfectly as Jesus did, we are not immune to pain, grief, and trouble in this life (John 16:33). Second, that He understands and identifies with us in our pain and grief (Isaiah 53:3), and third, that God wastes nothing we go through but can make good come from it (Romans 8:28).

I know it might sound crazy, but I have found that each time I go through things like this, I learn more about how good and how faithful God is. Yes, it still hurts, but I can't imagine trying to walk through this without Him.

We did it despite Covid-19 because we knew an evangelistic camp is an excellent platform for our disciples to share the Gospel with their friends and family. We were encouraged by seeing their hearts for the lost. As a result, a Polish teenager, Zuza, gave her life to Christ. It was her third camp, so it took her three years to make that decision. Praise God!

We also praise God for Lester, our young friend, who uses a wheelchair. He has also been coming to our camps for many





years. This year he got baptized. Last summer his fear of water overcame him, but this year Bogdan and Lester's father baptized him in the lake on the last day of camp. It was a very special moment for all of us.

There were many examples at camp of showing the love of Christ in practical ways. When some believing campers took David on a kayaking trip, despite his disabilities, it softened his heart a little more. He is a big, tall man, and it took a lot of effort to help him get into a kayak and finish the trip safely,

but it was worth thousands of words explaining God's love! David has been coming to our camps for over ten years. He was angry with God for his tragic accident and very resistant to talk about Jesus. This year he was a different man. His heart was much softer. We continue to pray for his salvation.



There was a beautiful spirit of unity which permeated the atmosphere at the camp. It was a wonderful thing to serve with one common purpose—to help non-believers come to the saving relationship with Christ.

SLOVAKIA: Hope needed in the face of setbacks.



The Roma in Sabinov, Slovakia, built a church out in the middle of an open field with help. After a few years, the church bought a strip of land across the road. They divided it into 21 lots. Different families from the church worked and saved so they could buy a lot. The church sold 13 lots to people in the church and still owns the other eight. The local town council gave a tentative go-ahead for the projected street of homes, so the pastors worked with an architect to get a duplex design that would allow each family to have their own home on their own plot. They obtained permits from the water, gas, sewer, and electric companies. The regional building permit office was on board. After a couple of years, all the Roma families were anticipating finally being able to begin the long-awaited process of building their own homes.

It was at this point that some people following an anti-gypsy political group who are against the church Roma families being able to build these homes started circulating a petition. They were not honest with the public and used fear as a tactic. They succeeded in getting the 10,000 signatures needed to make the town council members reconsider. Without the final approval from the

council, the project was halted. Now, over a year later, permits are expiring. One family with five children invested their savings and are about to be homeless because no one will rent them an apartment. This racism is real. The pastors and families are discouraged. The politicians are afraid of the political group and the neighbors. However, we know, "What seems impossible for man is possible with God." Luke 18:27.

Please pray with us for this situation and for the many Slovak Roma believers who need help to get their own housing. We're seeking land we can purchase for a similar project with our partner organization, Stability International. We've had many meetings with leaders and mayors in different villages and possible towns, including the mayor and pastors in Sabinov. We're asking God to lead us.

LETTER TO THE CHURCH IN PHILADELD SLOVAKIA

Slovakia has been spared much of the hardships from the Covid-19 experienced in America and elsewhere in Europe. However, we too, have had to do ministry differently because of strict government guidelines. My weekly three-hour men's Bible study had to be via social media. Church services were canceled. But throughout this time, we have also seen God's hand at work in powerful ways. There is a greater hunger for not just fellowship but for hope, which makes sharing the Gospel very practical and fruitful. I'd like to share just one example.

I was asked to be the guest preacher at a special church service in celebration of the 200th anniversary of the new sanctuary. It was an honor as an American to be asked to speak, and especially because it was the last time we would be allowed to gather together for the foreseeable future. The new rules, which forbid gatherings indoors, including weddings and funerals, went into effect at midnight. There was almost a palpable feeling of both celebration and grief at the same time. Long in advance, they asked me to speak on the church of Philadelphia from Revelation. God promised this church that they would be spared from the trials coming upon the whole earth because they had been faithful in the midst of great hardship

and that, even though they were small, they were undefeated. God promised to open to them a door that no one could shut. Just as the pandemic was becoming severe worldwide, and the government was shutting their doors, I preached that God was opening the doors to them to be missionaries just as the early church, which fled Jerusalem and carried the Gospel with them. There were a lot of tears shed as we closed and locked the doors behind us and then turned towards the world around us in need of the Gospel. The Father's Heart ministry is here communicating God's heart for Slovakia, and we see His sovereign hand at work, bringing us here nearly 25 years ago to encourage missions.

we saw how Jesus set people free from severe bondage and helped them out of deep darkness into his light. They went through a thorough process of forgiveness, and Jesus renewed their lives.


It showed me that there are no limits for God's children during such times of restriction if He gives favor. The Spirit of God works on all levels of our existence.

LOVE LIKE IT'S GOING IN THE BIBLE

I never thought 2020 would make me consider how much I engage in small talk with so little action. How chats between my co-workers and me were just time-fillers, and how 2020 would change that in my world.

For most of the COVID crisis, I worked for a company that took COVID very seriously. They required us to wear masks. We couldn't enter our co-workers' office to work, or even just to share about our weekends over coffee. It isolated us. It made small talk almost obsolete because who wants to stand six-feet apart and talk about the weather, right? Here's what God taught me in this.

What used to be quick "How are you? How was your weekend?" chats became more intentional conversations.

"How is your elderly mother who lives with you? Can I help shuttle her to the doctor?"

"How is your child, who is auto-immune compromised?"

"I know you work all day and have the house to run at night. Do you need me to get your groceries?"

"I know homeschooling is wearing you out. You seem tired and worn. Can I pray for you?"

God used COVID to force me to get serious about being in their business. I cared about their elderly

mother and their child with the auto-immune disease. Yet how often I asked those questions, not out of the intention to take action if needed, but because it was what you do in small talk. While I did care, God convicted me that I needed to love like I was on a mission. I had to love like it was going in the Bible. I had to act on their answers, either in prayer or in deeds. I had to follow-up and course correct if what I was doing to help and serve wasn't meeting needs. If I am honest, my chats at the water-cooler before COVID were superficial, like making small talk. Now it was time to be ready to act on "how are you doing?" By God's grace, I learned to love more in real ways. I learned to be intentional, even in those small talks over coffee, six-feet apart.

Proverbs 3:3 tells us, "Let love and faithfulness never leave you." I pray that I call to mind this scripture as I reflect on these times, to love people as if it's going in the Bible.

You might ask, "Why did we go to so much work to come home and write out the information?"

We wanted to *Shine For Jesus*. When you can remember and say the person's name the next time you meet them, it says you are different (loving and caring) and they start wondering why!!

Gospel Steps:

- 1) Start caring friendships. Be friendly to all God's open doors for you.
- 2) Eventually ask, "Are you interested in spiritual things?" Don't worry about their answer. Be a good listener.
- 3) Ask, "Can I share with you about my spiritual journey?" Prepare by writing out and practicing your salvation testimony beforehand (three minutes). (Need help? Contact me—I will send you a testimony worksheet.)
- 4) What joy it is helping people come to Jesus and "Populating Heaven"

Ben lives alone—Kent reads the Bible with him, walks, and plays checkers

Dale and Kelly—their daughter is going through a divorce. They have the children much of the time. Need to encourage and pray for them.

Hosea and Courtney—she works for ENT Dr. and brought me swim plugs. I bought her a pizza coupon, as thanks. Game night.

Rick and Crystal—like to walk, hummingbirds; visited two times, appointment and activity next week.


Joyce has a foster child; Kent almost fainted while walking, she offered to drive us home. Invited for coffee.

Homegoings

JAMES WILLIAM HURD

June 29, 1936 - October 24, 2019

From his wife Roberta: "In July of 1995, Jim and I led a team from Iowa to Hungary, holding a ten-day discipleship camp. Upon our return, Jim had a difficult time going back to secular employment; it seemed so meaningless to him. That fall, Darwin challenged us to consider going full-time with IM, which we did in December 1996. We returned to the States in November 1998 primarily because our twin grandsons, Caleb and Joshua, were one year old and mentally and physically handicapped. Our son and his wife had four children under six and needed our help. We continued returning to Hungary, leading a family camp with the Dannes in 2000 and then did various ministries with the Moores in Romania: Bible Schools, eyeglass distribution, and hospital ministries, etc., in 2005. We were able to return five times to do various ministries.



We moved from Erie, Pennsylvania, to Arizona in 2014. Our two daughters live in the Tucson area, and as Jim's health continued to deteriorate, they encouraged us to make that change. At that point, Jim was unable to do ministry, his voice was impacted by Parkinson's, so it was difficult to hear and understand him. He walked with the aid of a rollator and was dependent on others for many things. But even then, he continued to impact people by his positive attitude, his interest in them, uncomplaining spirit, and faithful attendance at all church functions. In Arizona, he was purposely visited by two former employees who wanted to thank him for his impact on their lives and careers; one of them shared at his service, "Jim was the dad I never had," and we heard that from several men in our congregation. When we left Erie our pastor thanked us for the many areas of ministry we had served in the church, nursing home ministry, city mission ministry, Bible School helper, etc. still, he said Jim's encouragement and concern for the church and his family through some difficult times was one of his greatest gifts.

Jim passed away on October 24, 2019, from complications of Parkinson's Syndrome. He was 83 years old. Even to the end, if Jim were asked what stood out about his days of following the Lord, unequivocally, he would reply the opportunity to serve the Lord with IM. It was such a blessing to both of us.

CONTINUING CONNECTIONS WITH CHRISTIANS IN NEPAL

We returned to Nepal, January 8-30, 2020; our challenge: to provide and teach our friends how to run a camp for children. God opened doors for International Messengers Canada Society (IMCS) to partner with Gull Lake Center (Alberta Christian Camp), and six camp-trained adults joined the team. We were up close and personal with our 140 campers and co-workers. who explored the truth about love, belonging, and purpose as God's creation. Our team demonstrated that every individual, regardless of caste, ability, or status, is worthy of inclusion. A month later, our

friends successfully hosted another day camp for children

with mental disabilities.

We also held three leadership seminars—with two Bible School student groups and one BAM staff group. Each participant received the book "With You It Will Be Different," which was born after our 2016 seminars and published in 2018. These dear people respond to the unfolding and personalizing of the stories of leaders in the Bible with wonder and enthusiasm.

Since 2018, "PEP – Prerana (inspire) Education Partner-ship" has invested in the futures of needy children. In order to

review our objectives, audit, refine and plan for the future, we spent a day visiting one of the schools and two homes of PEP students. It is so hard to describe the sights, emotions, and humility that passed through us as we received their generous hospitality and saw how PEP program and the work of Beautiful Gate Church makes a difference to "the least of these."

Verna serves as a director on the board of International Messengers Canada Society (IMCS). Bruce is the volunteer leader of partner activities with Beautiful Gate Church in Nepal. They live in Calgary, Alberta.

Our dream for year three (April 2020-2021) included expansion into a rural community, growing from 30 to 65 students, working with more schools, empowering teachers so even more students would benefit, changed with the March lockdown. At this time, schools have not all re-opened, online learning is limited to those with good internet access, and the working poor are even poorer. PEP has provided curriculum workbooks for home study, emergency food relief, encouragement through phone calls and on-going connection. We also are pivoting and staying connected because God has given us these relationships for His glory.

I always remember what everyone's favorite seminary professor, Jerram Barrs at Covenant Seminary, said in a class in late 1999 as Y2K was rapidly approaching. With the hysteria increasing day by day, Jerram told the class, others at the seminary including some professors, kept asking him would he be able to protect his family?

It's funny what you remember, but I never forgot that.

As the coronavirus began making headlines early in the year and the death count slowly rose, I naturally thought Jesus wouldn't want us to forget about all those who might not have ready access to masks and hand sanitizers.

I began stocking up on them. I gave them to friends and family. I also bought a large number for those at a retirement home in the inner city close to where I attend church. The pastor was able to get them to an older woman in the home who was a kind of evangelist of the place. She distributed them with other Christian materials we supplied.

I then began putting masks and hand sanitizers in my Little Free Library on my front lawn to go with the existing books by Martin Luther King, other good African-American writers, children's coloring books like Color the Gospel, Christian hip-hop CDs, and other books and DVDs. It seemed like a natural fit. I would usually put out about five masks and one bottle of hand sanitizer each day. And they were mostly taken by each night.



Looking back on the blur of the past ten months sometimes makes me question what country I will wake up in. Will it be India where the life and ministry we tried to form was interrupted by political problems? Or in Myanmar, where we taught English for a few months while trying to figure out our next steps? Or possibly even in the US, where we spent long months waiting out the Covid crisis? Or when I wake up, will I realize that I am in Mexico, where we are currently living, to check out new ministry opportunities at a camp?

When taken on a daily level, the stress of buying new plane tickets, not knowing when borders will open, questioning where God would have us, and trying to heal from leaving India unexpectedly, feels like chaos. In fact, if this were a movie, it would be B-rated. I would be staring at the TV muttering to my husband, "They don't actually expect us to believe this could happen, right?"

When we were debriefing our time in India, our counselor had us make a timeline. We went back about five years and wrote about big events, losses, high points, and other things of significance. This big picture view made me smile as I pointed to those events in the past where God's hand was so evident. Even just five years later, some pieces have clicked into place. Likewise, I can smile even in the chaos's midst because I know the One who is drawing this entire picture. I can trust God to work in this year that feels so B-rated, knowing that His plan always includes "immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine" (Eph. 3:20).

Approximately thirty-five Polish campers and a 10-member camp team (from Canada, USA, and Lebanon) attended via Zoom from their homes. Each day camp included an opening session, a workshop on Hope presented by Grace, a small group Bible study in breakout rooms, a fellowship time (testimonies, worship, Q&A on the workshop, and Bible studies), and games done in the Bible study groups (scavenger hunts, Bible story tableaus, Bible trivia—via breakout rooms).

During the workshop and Bible study times, Elie Karam (IM staff in Beirut) led ten young people in their own breakout room.

After the camp day was officially over, the team members went into their own coffee-time breakout

rooms. Interested campers joined them for a more personal connection.

Most campers were alumni from past English Camps. It was a wonderful opportunity for follow-up, and discipleship for those still seeking and for the new believers.

Even after five hours/day over three

consecutive days of camp, the campers were involved and enthusiastic. The time in small groups and coffee rooms added to the personal connections that made the camp relational.

There were many comments at the end about doing Zoom camps quarterly. Personally, we hope this was the first of no others. But if the pandemic continues into 2021, we won't hesitate to repeat it if in-person camps continue to be restricted.

GOD WAS FAITHFUL. ARE WE?

Spring 2020 and quarantine—it was a tough time. At first, panic, fear, and the unknown. Closed at home, with no possibility of contact with others. Closed churches and no fellowship.

We are not a modern and media church. But we had to learn to reach people over the internet.

Here's what we did:

We created a group on Zoom for non-believers. Because it was a time of fear and uncertainty, our Bible study was about hope. Trained church members also attended these meetings and talked about how they deal with various problems. It worked because as of today, we meet once a week. We created a second Zoom group for believers. It functions to this day.

We couldn't go out with our scouts. But here, too, we started meeting through Zoom. Several scouts asked to be taught to read and understand the Bible. So we started teaching the Bible, to read and interpret from the Gospel of Mark.

The evangelistic project of the Street Church was suspended for a time. The authorities banned public meetings, and we could neither share the meal nor publicly proclaim the Good News. But we found a way. We prepared sandwiches and approached the homeless, fed them, and talked with them personally about the hope there is in Christ, all while keeping the social distance of two meters.

We have a family camp every year. But this year, there was no chance. The borders were closed. But God helped us, and we organized a Zoom Camp. It was a three-day conference during which the principal topic was about Hope in Christ. It was needed for many people who struggled with various concerns.

God was faithful to His Church and helped us with ideas and opportunities. It is worth relying on Him in every situation because He knows how to help.

In June, my wife Ewa had a bicycle accident and dislocated her elbow with a displacement in her right hand. To this day, she cannot straighten it or bend it. She has been struggling with pain and rehabilitation for three months. Please pray for her recovery.



Pre-Covid evangelism disappeared. Instead of talking with people face-to-face, we connected with unbelievers through encouraging texts and Scriptures. At the end of lockdown, as government measures relaxed, our church plant could meet in person in a park and in smaller groups in homes. What sweet fellowship we enjoyed! RIVERSIDE MISSIONARY TRAINING CENTER

After a seven-year hibernation, RIVERSIDE MISSIONARY TRAINING We desire to have two classes a God woke up RMTC and called us back out to prepare God's people for missions. During those seven years as a staff, we had been faithfully developing Mobilizing Uganda for Missions (MUM), Discipleship, Pastors/Leaders and Church Planting Training. Now that the

ministry is well established and reaching well over 150 pastors/leaders each year, we realized God is calling us back to missionary training.

On October 2, we graduated seven students, as they completed their three-month training at MUM Training Center in Jinja, Uganda. They now begin their eight-month internship assignments in different areas of Uganda. We are already beginning the second class in November, finishing in late January. Each class has only seven to eight students. We cover Old and New Testaments, Developing and Maintaining Healthy Relationships, Communication, Risk Assessment and Management in Ministry, Systematic Theology, and Bible Study Methods. 

OPPORTUNITY! Not Opportunity Lost

Our expectations for 2020 began on a high note! Early this year, we were looking forward to having more teams this year than ever before, but one after another canceled as travel bans and shutdowns became the norm because of worldwide mandates and closures.

Our Romanian foundation, River of Life, is a licensed and accredited provider of social services, helping needy pregnant women to keep their babies and children, and not abort or abandon them. We normally have about 30

residents living here. We are considered an essential service by the government, so we never shut down this year but had to jump through every hoop that the Romanian government and European Union required in each stage of alert or emergency they declared us to be under at any given time.

For me personally, the opportunity to join the Lord in His work has meant a season of fasting and prayer. But I have to admit I'm not a good faster, or intercessory prayer. My mind wanders, and I would get headaches when I didn't eat. But I felt called; I felt compelled. Even so, I'm ashamed at how easily my noble conviction caved in to my desire for a snack!

Despite my weaknesses, this season of prayer and fasting has shown me much. At times I have been humbled and convicted. My prayers

became less of a shopping list of things I wanted God to do. Something changed. I got on board with His agenda. I felt like I was truly joining the Lord in His work. Praying and proclaiming His Truth, until He comes, our opportunities to join Jesus in His work that I refuse to give up, especially in times like these!

LOVE IS A PRECIOUS RESOURCE

Youth ministry requires a lot of energy and creativity to get them participating and involved in growth and yield towards the Gospel. I have been graced with an understanding of the game of soccer, having grown up with a strong desire for sports. I could have introduced them to baseball, but they have teams to play against. Or I could have introduced them to basketball, but I have little knowledge of the sport. So soccer is what most of the people in Uganda understand and love so much. It is a grassroots sport, and our Good News needs to reach the grassroots. I started a soccer ministry called New Hope Football Club. So far we reach out to 70 youth in this community and about 40 families where they come from. Some of them have accepted the Gospel, and others we continue to trust in God for their salvation.

One Sunday evening, as we were getting ready for a soccer match, I spoke some motivational words to the players, and after my speech one of them said these words to me.

"You like to brag too much."

My mind instantly pondered this statement used by one of the youths that I minister to. It reached to my bone marrow and the deepest part of my heart.





God has and is still using it to drive me into His Word. I looked at him and said I am sorry because love is not boastful. Love is patient with everyone. I was just not patient with them. I wanted them to grasp what I taught and didn't think about how they are trying hard to learn.

The Spirit brought these verses to mind, "Love never fails because it never gives up." God is transforming the boys and me.

I have started this daily training fellowship as we play soccer, sharing God's Word, and praying for each other's needs and salvation for our families. It is my prayer to see people with an understanding of Gospel-oriented sportsmanship come down to minister to these souls.

This love of the Father has also enabled me to stay and love-on the kids in the Gulu Centre for Christian Missions Home of Hope. It is a blessing to see their smiles each morning.

During this past year, God blessed me with a ministry that I never planned or imagined. Actually, the story began already when I was in middle school. By then, I had given much time to study English. I didn't know that God would use this much later in life. Now He has.

This year God put on my heart to help the interns of the Desertside Training Center with English. I started an online English school, teaching two days a week. I also have American friends who help by doing regular online conversation times with them to apply what they learn with me. Shortly after that, I added a translation training program for them. The goal of the school is to train the students to translate for North Americans at IM camps. Georgina didn't speak English when she began her training with IM. Now she can communicate with Americans. I believe that one day she will be a good translator and she might even teach others. Remonda always had the desire to serve as a translator. She began this training, and now she is one of our new generation translators. Remonda can translate precisely and accurately, even American idioms.

God blessed me this year with another online ministry. One of my friends in the States asked me to teach her Arabic. This was a fresh experience for me. I took a big step of faith, and God helped tremendously. The group steadily grew, and we now have four students. It's a challenge to teach people who come from a different culture. Arabic, for Americans, looks funny at times. One student said: "There are sounds I thought never existed." Now they can do some small talk in Arabic. The goal is to equip Americans to master certain language skills in Arabic here in the Middle East. For the sake of the Gospel, we walk together through the difficult, cross-cultural territory. One of these students wants to help Syrian refugees in Europe. This class is her chance to learn the heart-language of those refugees. I'm so thankful that God gave me this language ministry.

As we traveled 40 hours to return home from Nepal, on January 30, the WHO declared a state of emergency of international concern because of Covid-19. We are increasingly grateful for the technology that allows us to stay connected in real-time despite the world travel restrictions. Almost weekly phone/video chats offer two-way encouragement and we are deeply encouraged and challenged to live selflessly following the example of our Christian friends in Nepal.

International Messengers Canada Society (IMCS) has an agency agreement with SDC/SDSS (Beautiful Gate Church and NGO) to guide working together effectively for God's Glory. Their expertise in healthcare allowed them to pivot when asked to help their ward and other municipalities with training and management of case tracking for government records, also, with contact tracing and training ambulance drivers, hospital workers and government administrators. They have served effectively by providing training,

providing a workforce to sanitize isolation units, providing PPE and shields for front-line workers, and humbly acknowledging their Christian identity. They have pivoted to use their skills and resources to share with all.

And we are privileged to take part because God gave us the gift of relationship one short mission trip back in 2016 and grew it with trips in 2018 and 2020. Using the gifts and experience God has given Bruce and me has morphed into meaningful coaching and encouragement to tackle practical ways that SDC/

SDSS does their work and declares God's love and identity in a country where it is illegal to proselytize. Love is the language of service and connection.

A pregnant, hormonal orphan teenager quarantined during a world-wide pandemic... this is who I spent the entire two-month lockdown in Romania with, and I wouldn't have traded it for the world.

While lockdowns prevented any volunteers from physically entering the orphanage, 15 kids and I exchanged daily verses and messages, one girl asking to do an online Bible study... but more than that I had a one-on-one opportunity right at home. Re-welcoming this young girl in my apartment, we had daily devotionals, prayed together, celebrated a quiet Easter, and she surrendered her heart to the Lord!

The two of us also tried to maintain contact with the orphans, including her three younger brothers, who we were eagerly praying for. Video calls and messenger helped us stay connected and deepen relationships.

One day, it was a surprise to receive a call from the director of the orphanage wanting to help place those three younger brothers permanently in my care! Apparently, not all work halted in Romania (or in the heavenly realm). I gladly rejoiced at the opportunity, and I am moving forward in this path as they seek to have all kids placed in homes by the end of 2020.

As soon as lockdowns ended, these kids flooded my apartment (within regulations), and it was such a blessing to see that God did not close the door when the government did. Each of these kids is precious and pursuing a persistent relationship with them is a way in how God worked through me and in me to remind us all of his never-ending love and long-suffering through every trial.

I felt lost! I asked God, "How will I take care of my family financially? What is the future going to look like?"

Our children's ministry for the South Sudanese parentless children from the refugee camps needed my time, and it became difficult to continue with my full-time job and also serve these children effectively.

After going through our family financial situation with my wife Beatrice, we had to make this hard decision to step out in faith without fear, and I decided to quit my job even when my job was the

only major source of income for the family!

It's been nine months since we stepped out in faith, and God has been with us every single day! God has been providing for family needs, our and watching these children grow in the Lord. This has given us the joy that no job or money will ever give! We have been able to attend a three-month training course in missions this vear at the Riverside Missionary Training Center here in Uganda despite the Covid-19 Pandemic.

This training has been a huge blessing! Now, we are looking forward to sharing the Gospel to the lost world! Our God Reigns!!
